# **Evergreen IV Scenario Dimensions**

<u>International Stability & Cooperation</u>: how well nation-states interact with each other and their level of respect for international norms.

<u>US National Stability & Role of Government</u>: the relationship between the government and the governed; the degree of political, social and economic unity or discord within the nation.

<u>Population Shift & Demographics</u>: the degree of mobility and demographics and their influence on social order.

<u>Influence of Tech</u>: the rate of technological change and its relative assimilation into society.

<u>Resource Availability</u>: the accessibility and affordability of renewable and non-renewable resources and raw materials.

<u>Global Order</u>: the extent to which the world has either migrated to a single global government or fragmented into individual states with no established international governance

<u>Environmental Change & Adaptation</u>: the rate of change in the global environment, climate and constituent ecosystems; the ability of nations to adapt and manage the changes.

#### **Ongoing Research Projects**

#### Long View: How Did We Do?

- \* Project Long View completed in 1999.
- \* Scenario-based planning model for contemporary Evergreen program.
- \* Four drivers, five scenarios, robust world development.
- \* Finding: As a composite set, the five scenarios captured the current world across every descriptor.
- \* Scenario-based planning for an array of futures is a powerful tool to advantageously pre-position an organization for an uncertain environment.

# **Ongoing Research Projects**

<u>Strategic Needs Map</u>: Where do Evergreen Strategic Needs Manifest in Coast Guard Strategy and Initiatives?

- \* Mapped strategic needs from projects Long View (1999) through Evergreen III (2013) against Coast Guard strategic documents and initiatives.
- \* Many strategic needs directly link to themes in various Service strategies.
- \* Map identified 27 initiatives that can be tied to Evergreen work over the past 14 years (e.g. CG Sectors, MDA, North Atlantic Forum, Innovation, Prevention & Response Model).
- \* When fully executed, those strategic needs have transformed and modernized the Coast Guard.
