

USING STRATEGIC FORESIGHT TO PREPARE FOR INDO-PACIFIC CHALLENGES:

Anticipating the future to ensure peace, prosperity & the international rules-based order





In the face of global complexity and uncertainty, there is an urgency to better prepare for the future. The field of strategic foresight – designed to explore, anticipate and shape the future in a structured and systematic way - is a necessary tool for public policy.

This project is an opportunity to build a new strategic foresight partnership, through the Center for Strategic & International Studies (CSIS) Hess Center for New Frontiers focused on exploring the implications of megatrends that will shape the future of the Indo-Pacific.

This bilateral foresight relationship does not currently exist. Insights can be directly shared with the Australian Government Strategic Foresight Network (200+p).

Build partnerships & share expertise across Australia and US think-tank/academic/government networks



<u>Publish insights</u> to enhance policy and planning and build capability in considering and preparing for the future

My insights on US foresight community & work

- Passionate, diverse and resilient community of practitioners
- Well-coordinated despite not having a central/formal lead
 - No central foresight body (in or adjacent to government), but push to create one
- Incorporating futures into strategy development and change processes
- More developed futures capabilities in the intelligence/security community
- Adopt 'futures my stealth' where required
- An ability to move between government, consulting, think tanks to translate futures approaches and build expertise
- Less appetite for in-person and long events
- Some siloed aspects to working particularly across Defence
- Frustrations with proving value/evaluating impact

The National Security College

- Established over 10 yrs go under former Australian Prime Minister, now US Ambassador, The Hon. Kevin Rudd, PhD.
 - Joint initiative between the Commonwealth Government and The Australian National University (ANU) to lift national capability and deepen debate about emerging security challenges and policy options.



Rudd

- Led by Prof. Rory Medcalf, the <u>NSC</u> is defined by a trusted status, bridging the academic, government, industry and general communities in its work.

- Funded by 19 federal gov agencies + central gov grant + revenue from training programs.



Push of the Present

Where is the world now heading and how can we make a difference?

What processes of change are underway?

What is currently pushing us to change ourselves or to change things around us?

These include trends and other changes in society and people's lives.



Push of the Present

- WoG challenges complexity of the domestic and international pressures
- Collaboration to ensure budget efficiency with a focus on national interest
- Public Service Review need for foresight & 'stewardship' added to APS Act
- APS Futures Project & Primer big, positive response from across government
- Demand for futures work consistently high without having to advertise
- Upcoming election in 2025 opportunity and risk for foresight work
 - Incoming Gov wants to know more about the future
 - Machinery of Government changes impact on futures teams



Pull of the Future

What are our images of the future?
What is the best thing that could happen?
Here, you can consider different dreams, plans, visions.



Pull of the Future

- A recognition that we need to think and work differently to succeed in the future
- Policy processes and proposals explicitly adopting a multi-generational approach
- Foresight is core element of policy training and processes in government
- Departments conduct their own environmental scans and adjust planning
- Foresight is incorporated annually into Gov & Ministerial strategic planning
- Public servants have the skills & time to think about the future explicitly
- Large and developed futures team in central government who publish futures work for key government stakeholders and the public
- Chief Futures Office in Government/Ministerial level to oversee policy development (Welsh-type model)
- Greater opportunity to move in and out of Gov to do this work



Weight of the Past

What kinds of limitations and obstacles does the past impose on us?

What prevents us from moving forward?

These may include different commitments, persistent beliefs and unsustainable worldviews, values or ways of thinking.



Weight of the Past

- Culturally short-term thinkers
 - Public service incentivised for immediate delivery at expense of long-term thinking
 - A struggle with our history of colonialism and recognition of indigenous history, experience and traditional approaches to preparing for the future
- Short election cycles (3 years)
- No legislative requirement for futures analysis in government
- Longer-term analysis sits in intelligence community and insights not widely shared
- Tradition of re-inventing futures functions from scratch every 5yrs or so
- Senior advocates for futures work move on
- Entrenched academic ways of working have constrained relationships between government agencies and academia
